MOTION TO DISMISS BY INTERVENOR-RESPONDENT WISCONSIN LEGISLATURE AND RESPONDENTS SENATORS CABRAL-GUEVARA, HUTTON, JACQUE, JAGLER, JAMES, KAPENGA, LEMAHIEU, MARKLEIN, NASS, QUINN, TOMCZYK, AND WANGGAARD

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Intervenor-Respondent the Wisconsin Legislature, through its counsel, and Respondents Senator Rachael Cabral-Guevara, Senator Rob Hutton, Senator Andre Jacque, Senator John Jagler, Senator Jesse L. James, Senator Chris Kapenga, Senator Devin LeMahieu, Senator Howard L. Marklein, Senator Stephen L. Nass, Senator Romaine Robert Quinn, Senator Cory Tomczyk, and Senator Van H. Wanggaard (the Respondent Senators), through their counsel, respectfully move to dismiss this case pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§802.06, 809.14, 809.63 and 809.84. For the reasons stated in the accompanying memorandum filed in support of this motion, this case should be dismissed.

1. This action challenges the constitutionality of Wisconsin's existing state legislative district boundaries and asks the Court to declare the existing boundaries unconstitutional, draw new boundaries, and order special elections. Pet. at 43-44.

2. The existing state legislative district boundaries were adopted by this Court in 2022, after being proposed by the Legislature and Petitioners in *Johnson v. Wisconsin Elections Commission (Johnson III)*, 2022 WI 19, 401 Wis. 2d 198, 972 N.W.2d 559. In the course of that

litigation, this Court decided or foreclosed every claim presented here. See *Johnson v. Wis. Elections Comm'n*, 2021 WI 87, ¶36, 399 Wis. 2d 623, 967 N.W.2d 469 (deciding contiguity); *id.* ¶3 (describing Court's role as "a purely judicial one"); *Johnson v. Wis. Elections Comm'n*, 2022 WI 14, ¶36, 400 Wis. 2d 626, 971 N.W.2d 402 (deciding contiguity); *Johnson III*, 2022 WI 19, ¶70 (same).

3. More than a year after *Johnson* became final, and one day after a change in this Court's membership, Petitioners filed this original action collaterally attacking *Johnson*. On October 6, 2023, this Court granted the petition in part. Some of the parties from *Johnson* intervened, including the Governor. The Court did not order the parties to submit responsive pleadings.

4. Dismissal is warranted for three independent reasons.

5. *First*, Petitioners lack standing to pursue either of their claims. Petitioners have not established any personal stake in this controversy and allege only generalized grievances.

6. *Second*, Petitioners and Intervenor-Petitioners' claims are barred by laches, preclusion, and estoppel.

7. *Third*, there is no legal basis for Petitioners' requested declaratory or injunctive relief, nor any legal basis for their request for a writ quo warranto. And for the reasons already briefed in the Legislature and Respondents Senators' opening brief, *stare decisis* precludes relitigation of their contiguity claim, and their separation-of-powers claim is based on a mistaken understanding of this Court's judgment in *Johnson*.

WHEREFORE, the Wisconsin Legislature and the Respondent Senators request that this case be dismissed.
