What is your Argument?

Racial Profiling: Pulling up beside Sheriff's vehicle

Harassment: upon noticing me, Sheriff immediately, pulled behind me and follow me the entire way on two lane shoulder, close to expressway, then decide to give me a ticket for speeding when I only pulled up a short distance cause the two vehicles, in front of me pulled up. Nor attempt to follow the vehicles that was in front of him, WHY??

Indignant attitude: Sheriff told me, "Since you is hostile, I'm going to give you a ticket for no seat belt"

Lieing: Stating, speeding 75, when I make a short distance related to the two vehicles had pulled up, and not going to hit them

What is your Conclusion?

Judge Ramos court is incorrect related to not inquiring facts and information on details.
